MIN 5/ NG-CDFC/12/2024/2025: PROJECT PROPOSALS FOR FINANCIAL YEAR 2024/2025

The Fund manager brought to the attention of members the provisions of the Board's circular Ref No: NG-CDFB/CEO/NG-CDF CIRCULARS/VOL III (001) dated 22nd October 2024 on the preparation and submission of constituency project proposals for 2024/2025 financial year. He further emphasized on key areas of funding.

Section 6(1) of the NG-CDF Act provides that, "the Board shall with the approval of the relevant committee of the National Assembly, allocate funds for every constituency in each financial year in accordance with section 34"

Further, section 34(1) of the Act states:- "the budget ceiling for each constituency shall be the amount specified in Section 4(1) divided equally among all constituencies subject to provisions of section 8(1) and 23(1)

Malindi constituency allocation for FY 2024/25 is Ksh. 179,441,954 the allocation includes Ksh. 9,444,313 as emergency reserve.

Section 27 (1) of the NGCDF Act states;

"The chairperson of the Constituency Committee shall, within the first year of the commencement of a new Parliament and at least once every two years thereafter, convene open forum public meetings in every ward in the constituency to deliberate on development matters in the ward and in the constituency."

Further, section 27 (2) states that: "The Constituency Committee shall deliberate on project proposals from all the wards in the constituency and any other projects which the Constituency Committee considers beneficial to the constituency, including joint projects with other constituencies, consider the national development plans and policies and the constituency strategic development plan, and identify a list of priority projects, both immediate and long term, out of which the list of projects to be submitted in accordance with the Act shall be drawn from."

The list of proposed constituency based projects shall be submitted by the Constituency Committee to the Board.

The committee chairperson together with, the NGCDF committee members, local political and administrative leaders and other opinion leaders attended the public participation forums with the constituents in Shella, Malindi town, Ganda, Jilore and Kakuyuni wards to cover the entire constituency. The team gathered information on community needs and priorities which have been documented into the ward report.

Deliberation on the Ward Report

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The public participation was conducted between 20th and 22nd November 2024. The members went through the memos, minutes and reports from all the wards/locations noting down all the projects proposed by the communities. The communities were guided on types of projects and the basis of consideration which included the amount allocated to the constituencies, constituency strategic plan and the National Government guiding policies.

Further, the committee prioritized the projects in terms of level of need and vulnerability of the communities, balanced development and the highlights of the strategic plan constituency and came up with a priority project basket, which was budgeted adhering to the budget ceilings and ministry of public works estimates.

a. Realistic Project cost estimates

- Projects designs
- User department preference

The committee considered the above in determining the realistic costs of the infrastructural projects

b. Ongoing Projects

The manager tabled a summary of the Monitoring reports that capture the status of all the projects and summary of the ongoing report that was submitted to the Board earlier. From the report six projects were reported as ongoing. Some of the projects were meant to be completed, however due to cost variations as advised by the public works, the projects needed more funds. All these projects were to be funded in different phases and required additional funds to both complete a phase or final phase and a little alteration due to items left out and project description. The manager reminded members that funding of ongoing projects takes precedence and must be done within three financial years.

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

MALINDI CONSTITUENCY BACKGROUND INFORMATION GEOGHRAPHICAL INFORMATION

1. LOCATION

Malindi constituency is a town located at the mouth of the Galana River, lying on the Indian Ocean coast of Kenya. It is 120 kilometers north east of Mombasa, located at Latitude 3.21799 and longitude 40.11692

2. SIZE

Malindi constituency, located in Kilifi County on the Kenya coast, covers a total area of approximately 1,612 square kilometers. The constituency includes both urban and rural areas with the town of Malindi serving as the main urban center and key coastal destination.

3. CLIMATE AND NATURAL FEATURES

Malindi is located along Kenya's coastline and has distinct climate and natural features that contribute to its uniqueness.

(I) CLIMATE

Malindi experiences a warm tropical climate that is characterized by high temperatures ranging from 24 degrees Celsius to 32 degrees Celsius (75 degrees Fahrenheit to 89 degrees Fahrenheit) with cooler temperatures during the evening and Morning.

Malindi experiences long rains from March to May and short rains from October to December

Rainfall is moderate ranging between 800mm to 1200 mm annually. This supports natural vegetation but can also lead to flooding during peak rainfall periods.

Due to its coastal location, Malindi experiences high humidity levels especially during the rainy season.

(II) NATURAL FEATURES

a. Coastal geography

Indian Ocean coastline- Malindi sits on the Indian Ocean. This major feature supports the tourism industry and local livelihoods

Coral reefs - Malindi is home to several coral reefs which are vital for marine bio-diversity and are key attraction for tourists.

b. Parks and Nature Reserves

Malindi marine national park and reserve- This is a protected area that covers both land and sea. It is home to diverse marine life including dolphins, sea turtles and over 600 species of fish. The park has attracted several eco-tourists and research activities.

Arabuko sokoke forest reserve- Located inland Malindi, this is Kenya's largest coastal forest. It harbors rare species of birds, plants and insects. The forest is crucial for conservation and biodiversity with species such as the Amani Sunbird and Golden –rumped elephant shrew

c. Rivers and water bodies

Sabaki river- This is one of the main rivers in malindi flowing into the Indian Ocean. The river plays a vital role in agriculture providing irrigation while contributing to the local ecosystem

d. Vegetation and wildlife

Coastal forests: Malindi is home to a variety of tropical and sub-tropical plant species.

Wildlife- Apart from marine life, Malindi is home to a lot of land based wildlife especially around the arabuko sokoke forest. Migratory bird species also travel across the region.

e. Tourism and Scenic spots

Beaches- Malindi is famous for its long stretches of white sandy beaches including silver sands beach and others. The beaches attract swimmers, surfers and sun buskers.

Malindi museum- Located within malindi town, the museum offers a glimpse into Malindi's history showcasing Swahili culture artefacts and exhibits of the Portuguese's influence

4. ETHNIC LINGUISTIC AND RELIGIOUS COMPOSITION

1. ETHNIC COMPOSITION

Malindi is home to various ethnic groups with the largest being;

MIJIKENDA- The Mijikenda is the largest ethnic group in Malindi comprising of seven sub-groups majority being the Giryama.

SWAHILI- the Swahili people who are a mixture of Arab African and Persian ancestry also make up a significant portion.

OTHER ETHNIC GROUPS- There are also small numbers of ethnic communities such as kikuyu Luo and luhya whom majority have migrated to Malindi for business.

2. LINGUISTIC COMPOSITION

The linguistic landscape of Malindi reflects its ethnic diversity;

KISWAHILI- This is the dominant language spoken by the majority of the population. It is widely used for communication.

MUIKENDA LANGUAGES- Different sub-groups speak different languages with giryama being the most widely spoken.

ENGLISH- English is widely used in urban areas as it is the official language in government and business setting.

ARABIC- Due to the Arabic-Swahili influence, Arabic is spoken by some members of the community

3. RELIGIOUS COMPOSITION

Malindi has a diverse religious landscape;

ISLAM- The majority of the population in Malindi is Muslim with Islam being the predominant religion in the coast region of Kenya.

CHRISTIANITY- There is significant Christian population majorly catholic and protestant.

TRADIDITIONAL AFRICAN RELIGION- A small portion of the population still practices indgeginious African religion.

GENDER RATIO

MALE POPULATION

The Male population in Malindi is approximately 50.5% of the total population

FEMALE POPULATION

The female population accounts for approximately 49.5% of the total population

SEX RATIO

The number of males per 100 females in Malindi is 102:100 which is common in many regions in Kenya, however in older groups women outnumber men.

5. EDUCATION LEVEL

1. ENROLLMENT RATES

PRIMARY EDUCATION

- -There is high enrollment due to free primary education
- -More males are enrolled compared to girls with the dropout rate being higher for girls due to early pregnancies and domestic responsibilities. A small number of boy's dropout due to poverty.

SECONDARY EDUCATION

- -There is steady improvement but access remains limited especially in rural areas
- -Due to gender disparities fewer girls are enrolled due to cultural factors and economic pressure

TERTIARY EDUCATION

- -Limited higher education institutions in Malindi making students travel to urban centers for further studies.
- -Vocational training is however gaining popularity especially in technical fields.

LITERACY LEVELS

-The overall literacy rate is around 75% with male literacy being higher than female literacy but the gap is getting narrow.

EDUCATION ATTAINMENT LEVELS

PRIMARY SCHOOL COMPLETION – High completion rates although challenges arise in transition to secondary schools due to financial and social factors.

SECONDARY SCHOOL COMPLETION- Low completion rates particularly for girls due to early pregnancies and cultural pressures.

POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION – A small percentage proceed to tertiary institutions, however vocational and technical training are becoming a popular alternative.

Key crops in the sector include coconut, mangoes and cashew nuts

ELECTION TRENDS

VOTER TREND

Malindi has a diverse electorate. Historically politics in Malindi have been influenced by local community's interest but national politics are starting to become prominent.

2. POLITICAL PARTIES

Malindi has had strong ties to parties like ODM in the past elections, although the region saw a shift during the 2022 elections with the rise of UDA and Kenya kwanzas influence.

MALINDI PUBLIC PARTICIPATION/WARD FORUMS

The NG-CDF Act of 2015 as amended in 2022 recognizes the participation of the people in the determination and implementation of development projects in the constituency.

The Act provides that the chairperson of the shall within the first year of the commencement of a new Parliament and at least once every two years thereafter, convene open forum public meetings in every ward in the constituency to deliberate on development matters in the ward and in the constituency.

The Committee shall further deliberate on project proposals from all the wards in the constituency and any other projects which the Constituency committee may consider beneficial to the constituency, including joint projects with other constituencies, consider the national development plans and policies and the constituency strategic development plan, and identify a list of priority projects, both immediate and long term, out of which the list of projects to be submitted shall be drawn.

Commitment to Public Participation by Malindi NG-CDF Committee

Public Participation refers to the process by which citizens, as individuals, groups or communities (also known as stakeholders), take part in the conduct of public affairs, interact with the state and other non-state actors to influence decisions, policies, programs, legislation and provide oversight in service delivery, development and other matters concerning their governance and public interest, either directly or through freely chosen representatives.

The Constitution of Kenya 2010 restructured and transformed the state-society relations in several positive ways. It emphasizes that the country's governance is based on social contract, an arrangement in which the citizens only delegate their power to the government. The supreme law places the citizens at the centre of development and related governance processes.

Public participation is provided as one of the principles and values of good governance. Effective public participation is an indispensable element for people centered development by involvement of those that might be affected by a decision in the decision-making process.

It is a space for interaction with the people, the citizen are declared as sovereign and demand that the public must be involved in every aspect of public affair. It is one of the national values and principles of governance that binds all state organs, state and public officers to the people. It not only strengthens the state by legitimizing governmental actions and interventions, it is also important for good and democratic governance.

Public participation encompasses a range of procedures and methodologies designed to consult, involve, and inform the public and delegate decisions to them.

It is in these forums that the committee identified public needs, concerns and values that will help in development of sustainable programmes across the constituency. The committee ensured adequate consultation with local leaders and publicized the public ward meetings to reach all the constituents. The objectives of the forums were;

- · Citizens empowerment on the key mandate and functions of the fund
- Generation of new, diverse and innovative ideas and actions from the communities
- Enhancement of Citizen-Government relations

- Appropriate prioritization of development projects
- · Improve service delivery and responsiveness

Malindi NG-CDF Committee used the following tools to engage the public;

a) Submissions/memoranda

The public gave their views in written submissions/memoranda

b) Public forums

Provided an opportunity of face-to-face engagement between the committee and citizens through which instant feedback and observation of affairs of NG-CDF were received. Members of the public were free to attend the public participation meetings.

The expression and harmonization of the mentioned challenges informs key programmes to be considered for Funding through NG-CDF Programmes in the constituency. The NG-CDF Committee undertook public ward forums from 20th to 22nd November in the five administrative wards of Ganda, Kakuyuni, Jilore, Malindi town and Shella.

The committee used the following steps in organizing the public forums:

Created awareness- Placing adverts media, both print and electronic. This helped in generating awareness and increase citizen interest to participate and give views.

Stakeholders Involvement

Identifying the key stakeholders or interested groups including those directly affected and those that can offer solutions. Inviting them for meetings and requesting for submission/memoranda. The action plan was effectively carried out for accountability, the stakeholders were provided with the necessary information so as to enhance credibility of the process

Meetings

Held meetings to get views and feedback through field visits/barazas. Citizens were invited in time and allowed sufficient time to prepare and give their oral and/or written submissions

DELIBERATION FROM EVERY WARD

SHELLA WARD

The public participation forum for Shella ward was held on 20th November 2024 at Karima primary school. In attendance were; NG-CDF chairperson and committee, local leaders, opinion leaders, NGCDFC staff, religious leaders, teachers and principals, students and the general public.

a) The NG-CDFC Chairperson

The NGCDF committee chair explained to the forum the objective of the baraza. Wananchi were by law required to give their views and prioritize their development needs. He highlighted what the fund has achieved in terms of development in the ward and constituency levels. He explained eligible and ineligible projects fundable by NG-CDF.

Mr. Kazungu Sammy the chairperson encouraged Wananchi to apply for bursaries when the word is out. The public was requested them to visit the NGCDFC offices for more information on how application shall be done. He touched on education and training programs, youth internships/industrial attachment program at the NG-CDFC offices. He requested the young people to come out to get the necessary skills to shape their careers. JILORE WARD

The second public participation forum for Jilore ward was held on 22nd November 2024 at Kakoneni primary school at 2:00pm. In attendance were; NG-CDF chairperson and committee, area chief, local leaders, opinion leaders, NGCDFC staff, religious leaders, teachers and principals, students and the general public.

a) The NG-CDFC Chairperson

The NGCDF committee chair explained to the forum the objective of the baraza. Wananchi were by law required to give their views and prioritize their development needs. He highlighted what the fund has achieved in terms of development in the ward and constituency levels. He explained eligible and ineligible projects fundable by NG-CDF.

Mr. Kazungu Sammy the chairperson encouraged Wananchi to apply for bursaries when the word is out. The public was requested them to visit the NGCDFC offices for more information on how application shall be done. He touched on education and training programs, youth internships/industrial attachment program at the NG-CDFC offices. He requested the young people to come out to get the necessary skills to shape their careers. Resolution of public complaints mechanism especially in bursaries, financial, audit and risk management and the need for efficient and effective project management were some of the key issues he mentioned.

b) The Area Chief

The area chief thanked the NGCDF committee for ongoing development projects across the ward. He touched on issues of projects promoting security and peace building initiatives, corruption prevention, climate change mitigation, safety and security measures and prevention of alcohol and drug abuse. He called upon the Wanachi to support government initiatives and interventions.

c) The Fund Account Manager

The FAM discussed with the forum the structure of the fund. He stressed the need to correctly capture the key information given by the citizens; the project activities, enrolment, size of land, number of teachers for administration blocks projects and ranking of projects in order of priority. The need for on-going projects to take precedence was clearly elaborated. The FAM listed the ongoing projects in the ward. The need for timely project completion of projects, service delivery at NG-CDFC offices, gender mainstreaming, disability mainstreaming, climate change mitigation, bursaries, social security, digital/innovation hubs, and HIV/AIDS are the issues he put more stress on. He emphasized on aligning development to the constituency strategic plan, the Bottom Up Transformation Agenda (BETA) the need for parents to support learning institutions.


