
MIN 2/ NG-CDFC/12/2024/2025: INTRODUCTION & ADOPTION OF THE AGENDAS

MIN 5/ NG-CDFC/12/2024/2025: APPROVAL OF PROJECT PROPOSALS FOR FINANCIAL YEAR 2024/2025

The Fund manager brought to the attention of members on the provisions of the Board's circular Ref No: NG-CDFB/CEO/NG-CDF CIRCULARS/VOL III (001) dated 22nd October 2024 on the preparation and submission of constituency project proposals for 2024/2025 financial year. He further informed members that the constituency had been allocated a total of Kshs. 170,469,856.74 for the current Financial Year and that the following key guiding areas as per the circular shall guide the preparation and submission of the proposals to the Board for consideration:

- 1. Project identification through ward forums
- 2. Consultation with the appropriate agencies on realistic project cost estimates
- 3. Consideration of ongoing projects
- 4. Budgeting of administration and Monitoring expenses
- 5. Consideration of climate change mitigation and adaptation activities
- 6. Financing of Constituency Digital Hubs
- 7. Funding of social security programme and Social Support Programme
- 8. Construction of NG-CDFC offices
- 9. Projects considered under Appropriation in Aid
- 10. Procurement of NG-CDFC Motor vehicle
- 11. Aligning Projects to BETA, Constituency Strategic Plan and other National Policies

a. Deliberation on the Ward Report

The Chair tabled to members the ward report that was conducted between 26th November, 2024 to 29th November, 2024 for discussion. from the report, the communities were guided on types of projects and the basis of consideration which included the amount allocated to the constituencies, constituency strategic plan and the National Government guiding policies. Each ward came up with at least 9 to 12 projects majorly in education, security and climate change areas as captured in the ward report (annex 3). c. Statutory ceilings for administration and Monitoring and Evaluation

The manager briefed members of the key guidelines by the Board and informed members that the Board laid more emphasis on the following areas:

- Provision of a detailed budget with clear breakdown of each component towards funds for administration and recurrent expenditure
- Allocation of funds to staff salaries to be informed by a documented staffing structure approved by the Committee with clear job description for each employee and must conform to the government guidelines on minimum wage.
- Consideration of other statutory deductions such as housing levy, National Social Security Fund (NSSF) and Social Health Insurance Fund (SHIF)
- Costing of the funds allocated to Monitoring and Evaluation to be informed by a proper work plan as provided in annex 2.

The said budgets were tabled by the manager and upon deliberations having considered the constituency allocation and the needs of the community, the committee members approved as provided in annex 1:

d. Climate change mitigation and adaptation activities

The manager tabled a guideline on climate change issued by the Board. The committee after deliberation considered funding of energy saving jikos in Boystown secondary school at a cost of kshs.1,500,000, Sambul Boys secondary school at a cost of kshs.1,500,000 and ADC Primary school kshs.1,500,000.

e. Funding of Social Security Programme and Social Support Programme

The Chairman shared summary report of the beneficiaries in the social support program that were enlisted and benefited from the scheme. Having gone through the process, the committee approved allocation of funds for 1000 vulnerable people at kshs 6000 each.

f. NG-CDFC Office

The Chairman informed members that the executive went to the county commissioner's office and asked for land for the construction of ng-cdf office. However, after meeting with the county commissioner, he promised to give land within the district headquarter but after a month later we were informed that there is no space at the district headquarters and another land will be given at chief camp.

After consultation with the leadership of the sub-county, it was found that the area is not fit.

g. Digital hub

The committee after consultation with the relevant stakeholders were informed of no availability of land to construct the digital hub.

h. Final project proposed with list of all prioritized projects

After a lengthy deliberation and consideration all areas as advised by the Board including but not limited to public participation, adequate consultation with public works, ongoing project, work plan and budgets for administration and monitoring vote, aligning project to BETA, constituency strategic plan and other National Government Policies, the committee agreed on the below listed projects to be forwarded to the Board for consideration and approval.

1.0 ABOUT NG-CDF

The Constituencies Development Fund (CDF) was established under the Constituencies Development Fund (CDF) Act, 2003, amended in 2007 and repealed by the CDF Act of 2013. In 2015, the CDF Act of 2013 was declared unconstitutional and a new Act was enacted in 2015, being the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Act, NG-CDF Act, 2015. The National Government Constituencies Development Fund (NGCDF) is under the Ministry of Planning.

The Constituency Development Fund (CDF) was introduced in Kenya in 2003 with the passage of the CDF Act 2003 by the 9th Parliament of Kenya which was repealed in 2013 by the CDF Act 2013. The CDF Act provides that the government set aside at least 2.5% of its ordinary revenue for disbursement under the CDF program.

The fund was designed to support constituency-level, grass-root development projects. It was aimed to achieve equitable distribution of development resources across regions and to control imbalances in regional development brought about by partisan politics. It targeted all constituency-level development projects, particularly those aiming to combat poverty at the grassroots and entrench equitable distribution of development.

The objective of the Fund is to provide mechanisms for supplementing implementation of the National Government development Agenda at the constituency level.

The CDF program has facilitated the putting up of new water systems, health and education facilities in all parts of the country, including remote areas that were usually overlooked during funds allocation in national budgets.

1.1 BACKGROUND INFORMATION – GARISSA TOWNSHIP CONSTITUENCY

1.1.1 Introduction

Garissa Township NGCDF is a Constituency Located in Northern Eastern Region in Garissa County, Kenya. The Constituency has four Wards and ensures that projects for the years are allocated fairly across the four wards

The constituency is one of the six (6) constituencies of Garissa County. The others are Dadaab, Fafi, Lagdera, Ijara, and Balambala.

The constituency is located in Garissa County.

1.1.2 Population Projections

According to the 2009 National Population and Housing Census, Garissa Township Constituency had a population of 91,143. Currently, the constituency has a population of 121,227 (2018) and is projected to increase to 142,174 in 2022. Further, its population density is 12 and is projected to increase to 14 by 2022 (see table 1-2).

These projections are based on a projected population growthrate of 3.22 per cent. Most of the population is based in the rural areas of whom majority are pastoralists are found in the grazing reserves and watering points.



1.1.3 Key Development Challenges in the Constituency related to key function of under NG-CDF Programme and beyond

Low Literacy Levels: The constituency has low literacy levels at 17.6 per cent. This is as a result of early marriages, femalegenital mutilation and exploitation of women among other negativevices. Other factors include absenteeism by pupils to attend homechores and in some instances shortage of role models. Staffing levels are low with teacher/pupil ratio of 1:77 and 1:11 at the primary and secondary levels respectively. Interventions need tobe put in place to fully address both socio-economic and cultural factors

affecting education with special interest in girl-child education.

Inadequate School Infrastructure: Most of the schools (especially secondary) lack adequate learning facilities and equipment. This has greatly affected the quality of education in the constituency which is clearly reflected by the performance in the national examinations. To improve the current education status, concerted efforts by all education stakeholders in the constituency to address both physical infrastructure and learning facilities will be enhanced.

Environmental Degradation: Continued charcoal burning, tree cutting, overgrazing and overstocking have led to massiveenvironmental degradation. A proper waste disposal system is lacking in all market centres. This has led to non-degradablewaste accumulation in the market centres.

Insecurity and Clannism: There have been increased cases of insecurity which manifests itself in form of inter-clan conflicts caused by fighting over resources such as land, water and grazing land.

The constituency population is dominantly comprised of the Somali people who identify themselves through the clans. The main clans include: Degodia. Clannism is a factor to consider in development planning and distribution of resources. Most of the conflicts experienced are related to sharing of resources especially water and pasture for livestock.

Inadequate Water Supply and Sanitation: The constituency is faced with acute water scarcity with only 50 per cent of the population having access to safe water. Most of the constituency population lives in rural areas and mostly uses unsafe water direct from the laggas, boreholes, shallow wells and pans. The average distance to the nearest water point is 20 Km. Water tracking has aided in providing water to settlements experienced with acute water problem. Further, as low as 80 per cent of the population use pit latrines while 20 per cent use other means of sanitation such as bushes. This poses a health hazard in terms of disease outbreak such as cholera.

Poor Roads: The constituency has a poor road network consisting of only earth surface roads. Roads are the most common mode of transport in the constituency despite their poor state. The entire feeder road network is in bad condition. All roads are rendered impassable during rainy season thus curtailing all movements by road within the constituency. The constituency lacks proper bridges hence drifts are commonly used along the laggas which are rendered impassable during floods hence needfor proper bridges.

Inadequate Health Facilities and Services: Provision of health services is affected by the few health facilities available within the county. The doctor patient ratio is 1: 100,000 which is verylow comparing with the national ratio of 1:5,000. There is need for the county government to invest in more doctors. Due to scarcity of the facilities, residents travel long distances to access health services with an average distance to the nearest health facility being 20Km. In addition, poor road network leads to many patients opting to forgo treatment. There is need, therefore, to put up staff houses and equip more health facilities so that community access healthcare within 10 Km.

Low Agricultural and Livestock Production: Low agricultural productivity has been witnessed in the constituency. Lack of access to farm inputs such as fertilizers, improved seed varieties, pesticides, machinery, and water shortage for effective irrigation form the bottlenecks to increased farm productivity. Poor access to markets for local farmers to sell their produce and earn income maintains them in the vicious cycle of poverty. The constituency lacks processing plants for value addition toagricultural and livestock products. The value addition is expected to increase products penetration to the wider markets.

Food Shortage: A large percentage of the constituency population (72%) is food poor. This is caused by over reliance on rain fed farming, poverty, lack of modern farming methods and high dependency on relief food. According to the 2015/16 Kenya Integrated Household Budget Survey (KIHBS) report, Garissa County headcount poverty rate stands at 62.6 per cent with 10.5 per cent hardcore poverty rate. Nationally, three sources accountfor three-quarters of all food purchases, namely; general shops (27.9%), open markets (26.6%) and kiosks (22%). Most of the purchases in the arid counties are sourced from kiosks with Garissa County accounting for the highest share (73.6%), followed by Turkana (57.1%) and Mandera (52.6%). Only a paltry 10.1 per cent of Garissa residents get food from their own sources. There is, therefore, need to introduce modern farming methods such asgreen houses and provide sufficient water for irrigation farming.

Poor Access to Markets: Due to poor state of the road infrastructure, markets are inaccessible especially during the rainy season. This leads to agricultural and livestock produce not reaching to the markets in time hence huge loses to farmers. Inadequate market information is a big hindrance to market access and also price trends.

The constituency lacks appropriate technology and skills to process and preserve agricultural and dairy products. Lack of market information and skills amongst the farmers and business community has hampered the expansion of the market for products from the constituency. Poor storage facilities affect production with 90 per cent of farmers using traditional storage methods. Inactive farmers, cooperative societies and associations coupled with poor roads are a hindrance to the marketing process. Livestock farmers are forced to bear with exploitative middlemendue to the lack of proper marketing strategies and cooperative movement in the constituency. There is need to strengthen farmers, institutions to improve marketing of farm and livestock products.

Human Wildlife Conflicts: The constituency lacks protected wildlife conservancy hence increased cases of human wildlife conflicts exhibited through snake bites, attacks of livestock by hyenas and lions. The common wildlife types are gazelles, giraffes, hyenas, ostrich and lions which are left to move freely. There is need to establish a protected area to avert these conflicts.

Land Ownership: All land in the constituency is held in trust by the government hence populace hold no title deeds. This limits farmers, capacity to develop their land for sustainable development. Consequently, this has led to poor land use systems leading to environment degradation. Land adjudication, survey and issue of title deeds should be addressed urgently.

Inadequate Power/Energy Source: In the entire county, not all towns are fully connected to power. Due to the rural inclination of most of the constituency populace, there is need to increase household and more market centres connectivity to the national grid.

Limited Financial Inclusion: The constituency lacks a sharia banking compliant financial

institution. This is a major challenge hindering the community to consume banking services. Lack of collateral has led to low credit uptake.

Population Growth: Like Garissa County, the constituency has a population growth rate of 3.22 per cent which is higher than the national one at 2.9 per cent. In addition, 62.9 per cent of the population lives in poverty; hence an increase in population has direct impact on the basic needs like food, water, health and education for all ages. According to the 2015/16 Kenya Integrated Household Budget Survey (KIHBS) report, those between 0 and 17 years, contribute 62 per cent of the total county poverty. The high population growth has been brought about by strong religious and cultural beliefs which advocates against use of family planning, polygamy and high

Culture: Some cultural practices have led to low development in the constituency. These include early and forced marriages of the girl child thus denying the youth opportunities to advance in education. Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) is at a high rate of 90per cent. This has exposed the girl child to risks such as HIV and AIDs infection. There is need to advocate and sensitize the population to do away with such negative cultural practices and pursue alternative channels of

1.1.4 Eligible Projects Fundable as per NG-CDF Act 2016

- Projects addressing devolved functions as outlined in the fourth schedule of the constitution

1.1.6 Establishment of Garissa Township NG-CDF Committee

The Constituency Development Fund Committee is established under the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Act of 2015. The Committee is expected to play the following

- Allocation of funds to various projects, determining the quantum of installments to various projects in the constituency, taking into account the disbursement received and the requirement of different projects;
- Submission of a list of constituency based projects to the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Board within the stipulated time;
- Determination of the allocation of the emergency reserve in accordance with the NG-CDF
- Making appropriate consultations with the relevant Government departments to ensure that cost estimates for the projects are as realistic as possible; and
- Ranking the constituency projects in order of priority, among other activities.

1.1.7 Implementation of Projects in Garissa Township

As has been stipulated in NG-CDF Act 2015, the Garissa. Township Chairperson of the NG-CDFC, has been convening open forum public meetings in the four (4) wards of the constituency to deliberate on development matters in the ward and the constituency. Each Ward prepares a list of priority projects and submits to the NG-CDF for deliberations. All the NG-CDF projects are implemented by the project management committee with the assistance of the relevant department of Government officers.

1.1.8 Review of Key Achievements

The Garissa Township Constituency Development Committee disbursed a total of Kshs. 462.5m between FY 2021-2024 towards the implementation of various projects in the sectors of Education, Security, Environment, Sports and Bursary. All the projects were done to completion and currently in use.

To improve on retention rates, a total of Kshs. 143M was used as bursary to assist needy students continue with their education at both secondary and tertiary schools. The constituency allocation

for bursary has been increasing since IY 2013/14, - 2023/2024.

1.1.9 Major Lessons Learnt

- Bottom-up approach in priority identification enhances project/programme ownership;
- If well managed, devolved funds can go a long way in improving accessibility, affordability and availability of services to communities. This would in turn improve the living standards of the constituents;
- The fund has empowered the Garissa Township Community to realize their felt needs in development;
- The fund has accelerated development at the grass-root level; and
- Devolved funds have the capability of easing social burdens e.g. payment of school fees, protection of water wells/springs protection.

1.2 RATIONALE FOR PUBLIC WARD FORUMS

The NG-Constituency Development Act 2015 as amended in 2022 provides that the chairperson shall within the first year of the commencement of a new Parliament and at least once every two years thereafter, convene open forum public meetings in every ward in the constituency to deliberate on development matters in the ward and in the constituency. The Committee shall deliberate on project proposals from all the wards in the constituency and any other projects which the Constituency committee considers beneficial to the constituency, including joint projects with other constituencies, consider the national development plans and policies and the constituency strategic development plan, and identify a list of priority projects, both immediate and long term, out of which the list of projects to be submitted in accordance with the Act shall be drawn.

Public participation encompasses a range of procedures and methods designed to consult, involve, and inform the public to allow stakeholders that would be potentially affected by a decision or policy to have input into the development programmes.

b) Preliminaries / Comments by the Area Chief

The area chief of Township Location welcomed members to the meeting after an opening prayer. He thanked the people present for attending the important development forum. He introduced the ward development committee and appreciated their efforts towards development on the area.

c) Comments by the Deputy County Commissioner He explained to the meeting the history of rural development funding in Kenya Since independence in 1963 aimed at fighting poverty at the grassroots level has been one of the key agendas of the Kenyan government. The government has initiated various rural development programmes including Special Rural Development Programme, District Development Planning, Rural Development Fund and the District Focus for Rural Development Strategy with the aim of improving people's wellbeing.

However, most of these programmes failed to address the needs of local people due to lack of political will, inadequate government funding, lack of appropriate technology, neglect of institutional development, lack of beneficiary participation and poor coordination from top to the bottom. However, in 2003 the government introduced Constituency Development Fund (CDF), to fight poverty at the grassroots and since its inception; NG-CDF has had tremendous impact among the rural communities in Kenya

d) Comments bythe Area Member of County Assembly The area MCA appreciated the joint effort towards development in the constituency and called upon the members to diligently work for the betterment of the area. She pointed out that the elected leaders should be given an opportunity to serve the citizens and that politics should now be kept at bay until 2027. She thanked the NG-CDF team for organizing the forum since this is a vital road map towards people's driven development.

e) Comments by the Fund Account Manager He enlightened the members on the eligible projects fundable by NG-CDF and ineligible projects which are fundable by devolved systems, and also briefed the meeting on the statutory ceilings specified in the NG-CDF Act 2015 which guide the NG-CDFC during projects funding. He also stressed that after the exercise in all the wards the NGCDFC will rank the projects in order of priority and that the on-going projects shall take precedence over all other projects.

f) Comments by the NG-CDFC Chairman The chairman appreciated the members concern for development. He highlighted that NGCDF has achieved a lot towards development in the constituency, and the overall aim of this is to ensure active participation of people in the achievement of sustainable development.
