#### 1.0 ABOUT NG-CDF

The Constituencies Development Fund (CDF) was established under the Constituencies Development Fund (CDF) Act, 2003, amended in 2007 and repealed by the CDF Act of 2013. In 2015, the CDF Act of 2013 was declared unconstitutional and a new Act was enacted in 2015, being the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Act, NG-CDF Act, 2015. The National Government Constituencies Development Fund (NGCDF) is under the Ministry of Planning.

The Constituency Development Fund (CDF) was introduced in Kenya in 2003 with the passage of the CDF Act 2003 by the 9th Parliament of Kenya which was repealed in 2013 by the CDF Act 2013. The CDF Act provides that the government set aside at least 2.5% of its ordinary revenue for disbursement under the CDF program.

The fund was designed to support constituency-level, grass-root development projects. It was aimed to achieve equitable distribution of development resources across regions and to control imbalances in regional development brought about by partisan politics. It targeted all constituency-level development projects, particularly those aiming to combat poverty at the grassroots and entrench equitable distribution of development.

The objective of the Fund is to provide mechanisms for supplementing implementation of the National Government development Agenda at the constituency level.

The CDF program has facilitated the putting up of new water systems, health and education facilities in all parts of the country, including remote areas that were usually overlooked during funds allocation in national budgets.


#### 1.1 BACKGROUND INFORMATION – FAFI CONSTITUENCY

#### 1.1.1 Introduction

Fafi Constituency is an electoral constituency in Kenya. It is one of six constituencies in Garissa County.

The constituency comprises of Fafi and Alinjugur districtis .Fafi District was curved out of Garissa District in 2007. The constituency borders Ijara constituency to the South, Tana River District to the South West, Dadaab constituency to the North and Garissa township constituency to the West and the Republic of Somali to the East.

The constituency lies approximately between latitudes 0015°N and 1030°S and longitude 39051E and 41032°E. The district covers an area of 16,325 km². Figure 1 below indicates the map of the Constituency. The constituency is one of the six (6) constituencies of Garissa County. The others are Lagdera, Garissa township, Dadaab. Ijara, and balambala.



The constituency has fivewards, all electing representative members of county assembly. The wards comprises of Dekaharja, Fafi, Jarajilla, Nanighi and Bura ward.

# 1.1.2 Key Development Challenges in the Constituency related to key function of under NG-CDF Programme and beyond

Insecurity: There have been several cases of reported insecurities and this relates to the presence and influx of Al-shabab in to the forest part of the constituency. Inspection and implementation of both government and other donor organizations projects has been challenges for the 10 years with officers inspecting project using the GK branded vehicles exposing them to a high risks of IED attack. This compels officers to hire a private vehicle which hikes the cost of implementation of projects

High illiteracy Levels: This has been attributed to by factors like; practice of pastoralism, early marriages, femalegenital mutilation and exploitation of women among other negativevices. Other factors include absenteeism by pupils to attend homechores and in some instances shortage of role models. Due to insecurity of major parts of the constituency, there is a low staffing levels in most of the schools and some schools in the high volatile areas are more likely to be closed

Deforestation leading to environmental ruin: Massive deforestation is attributed to by: charcoal burning, tree cutting, overgrazing and overstocking have led to environmental degradation. A proper waste disposal system islacking in all market centres. This has led to non-degradablewaste accumulation in the market centres.

Inadequate Water Supply and Sanitation: The constituency is faced with serious water scarcities with only 45 per cent of the population having access to safe water. Only a section of the population residing rear the Tana River banks gets access to water. Settlements kilometres away from the river depends on unsafe water from the laggas, boreholes, shallow wells and pans. In some parts of the constituency there are no water reservation sites and hence exposing both human and livestock population to a cute water shortages.

This challenges has affected negatively both primary and secondary schools ,making learning difficult, prompting the need to buy water bowsers for schools.

Poor Roads: The constituency has a poor road network consisting of only earth surface roads. Roads are the most common mode of transport in the constituency despite their poor state. The entire feeder road network is in bad condition. All roads are rendered impassable during rainy season thus curtailing all movements by road within the constituency. The constituencylacks proper bridges hence drifts are commonly used along the lag gas which are rendered impassable during floods hence needfor proper bridges. The poor road condition have also prompted high insecurity in major parts of the constituency

Other challenges affecting development includes: inadequate health facilities, food shortages, persistent drought, culture etc

# 1.1.3 Eligible Projects Fundable as per NG-CDF Act 2016

The eligible project fundable by NG-CDF as stipulated in section 24 of the NG-CDF (Amendment) Acts 2016 as those that are in:

- Respects of works and services falling within the function of the National Government under the constitution
- Must be community best to ensure that the prospective benefits are available to a wide spread cross- section of the inhabitants of a particular area.

#### 1.1.4 The in eligible projects include:

- Projects support religious bodies or religious activities
- Project supporting political bodies or political activities
- Recurrent costs of completed projects
- Personal awards
- Projects targeting a specific club or group of people to the exclusion of others
- Projects addressing devolved functions as outlined in the fourth schedule of the constitution of Kenya

# 1.1.5 Role of Fafi NG-CDF Committee

The Fafi Constituency Development Fund Committee is established under the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Act of 2015. The Committee mandate is to undertake the following:

- Allocation of funds to various projects, determining the quantum of installments to various projects in the constituency, taking into account the disbursement received and the requirement of different projects;
- Submission of a list of constituency based projects to the National Government Constituencies Development Fund Board within the stipulated time;
- Determination of the allocation of the emergency reserve in accordance with the NG-CDF Act, 2015;
- Making appropriate consultations with the relevant Government departments to ensure that cost estimates for the projects are as realistic as possible; and
- · Ranking the constituency projects in order of priority, among other activities.

# 1.1.6 Implementation of Projects Fafi

The chairperson together with members of the committee and the member of parliament has been convening open forumpublic meetings in the four (5) wards of the constituency to deliberate on development matters in all the wards. Each Ward prepares a list of priority projects and submits to the NG-CDF for deliberations. All the NG-CDF projects are implemented by the project management committee with the assistance of the relevant department of Government officers.

# 1.2 RATIONALE FOR PUBLIC WARD FORUMS

The NG-Constituency Development Act 2015 as amended in 2022 provides that the chairperson of the shall within the first year of the commencement of a new Parliament and at least once every two years thereafter, convene open forum public meetings in every ward in the constituency to deliberate on development matters in the ward and in the constituency. The Committee shall deliberate on project proposals from all the wards in the constituency and any other projects which the Constituency committee considers beneficial to the constituency, including joint projects with other constituencies, consider the national development plans and policies and the constituency strategic development plan, and identify a list of priority projects, both immediate and long term, out of which the list of projects to be submitted in accordance with the Act shall be drawn.

Public participation encompasses a range of procedures and methods designed to consult, involve, and inform the public to allow stakeholders that would be potentially affected by a decision or policy to have input into the development programmes.

Stakeholders play a central role in setting up priorities and objectives of development programmes in order to ensure relevance and appropriateness. The NG-CDF Committee through public participation identifies public concerns and values that will help them develop a broad consensus on sustainable programmes in the constituency. The Chairperson shall therefore ensure adequate consultation with local leaders and shall publicize public ward meetings so as to reach as many constituents as possible. The main purpose for the public forum is to;

- Sensitize the community on matters NG-CDF especially on the key mandate and functions adducible to the Fund
- Give the community opportunity to deliberate on development matters in the wards and in the constituency.

The expression and harmonization of the mentioned challenges informs key programmes to be considered for Funding through NG-CDF Programmes in the constituency. For clarity and confirmation of the same, NG-CDF Committee undertook public ward forums (five wards) that took five days


#### 1.3 DELIBERATION FROM EVERY WARD

#### 1.3.1 NANIGHI WARD

The meeting took place on Thursday the 7th November 2024 at Warable sub-location.

a) Members Present

The members present are from the various categories including: NG-CDF Committee, Area Member of National Assembly, Area Member of County Assembly, Deputy County Commissioner, Area Chiefs, Area Elders, Secondary Schools Head Teachers, Primary Schools Heads Teachers, Religious leaders and Invited Stakeholders and other residents drawn from different parts of the ward



b) Preliminaries / Comments by the Area Chief
The area chief of Kamuthe Location welcomed members to the meeting after an opening

prayer. He was impressed by the huge number who attended the forum and commended those present for attending the important development forum. He introduced the ward development committee and appreciated their efforts towards development on the area.

c) Comments by the Deputy County Commissioner

He explained to the meeting the history of rural development funding in Kenya Since independence in 1963 aimed at fighting poverty at the grassroots level has been one of the key agendas of the Kenyan government. The government has initiated various rural development programmes including Special Rural Development Programme, District Development Planning, Rural Development Fund and the District Focus for Rural Development Strategy with the aim of improving people's wellbeing.

However, most of these programmes failed to address the needs of local people due to lack of political will, inadequate government funding, lack of appropriate technology, neglect of institutional development, lack of beneficiary participation and poor coordination from top to the bottom. However, in 2003 the government introduced Constituency Development Fund (CDF), to fight poverty at the grassroots and since its inception; NG-CDF has had tremendous impact among the rural communities in Kenya

d) Comments By The Fund Account Manager

The officer representing the NG-CDF board enlightened the members on the eligible projects fundable by NG-CDF and ineligible projects which are fundable by devolved systems, and also briefed the meeting on the statutory ceilings specified in the NG-CDF Act 2015 which guide the NG-CDFC during projects funding. He also stressed that after the exercise in all the wards the NGCDFC will rank the projects in order of priority and that the on-going projects shall take precedence over all other projects.

e) Comments By The NG-CDFC Chairman

The chairman appreciated the members concern for development. He highlighted that NGCDF has achieved a lot towards development in the constituency, and the overall aim of this is to ensure active participation of people in the achievement of sustainable development.

f) Comments By The Area Member Of National Assembly

He mentioned that if the public is involved in the full decision-making process during projects identification, their concerns may be met early on in the planning process when changes may be easier to make, rather than late in the process when even small changes may cost both time and money.

He informed the meeting that NG-CDF was established with the aim of improving service delivery, alleviating poverty, enhancing economic governance, and ultimately to spur development in the constituencies thereby contributing to socio-economic development of all the constituencies.

# b) Comments By The Fund Account Manager

The manager informed the community members present on the relevance of the forum as stipulated in the NG-CDF Act 2015 as amended in 2022, and the nature of projects fundable by NG-CDF, to include projects that are communal and benefit a wide cross section of the inhabitants, leaving out projects that benefit individuals, supporting political and religious bodies and those that are in respect of works and services falling within the devolved functions of the county government.

#### c) Comments By the Ng-Cdfc Chairman

He briefed the meeting on the various devolved funds in the constituency, and stressed the need of all the stakeholders to come together during planning to avoid duplication and double funding of projects. He called upon the County Government to share their development projects publicly to enable the constituents be aware of projects being implemented in their areas.

#### d) Comments By the Area Member of National Assembly

The Member of Parliament was impressed with the large numbers present and praised the committees for conducting public sensitization forum and encourage the committees to continue sensitizing the public, on bursary application and focus on development issues by putting politics at bay. He further informed the members that all the projects cannot be implemented at once but

gradually hence the need of setting priorities.







The area chief amuma Location welcomed members to the meeting after an opening prayer. He thanked the people present for attending the important development forum. He introduced the ward development committee and appreciated their efforts towards development on the area.

#### i) Comments by the Deputy County Commissioner

He explained to the meeting the history of rural development funding in Kenya Since independence in 1963 aimed at fighting poverty at the grassroots level has been one of the key agendas of the Kenyan government. The government has initiated various rural development programmes including Special Rural Development Programme, District Development Planning, Rural Development Fund and the District Focus for Rural Development Strategy with the aim of improving people's wellbeing.

However, most of these programmes failed to address the needs of local people due to lack of political will, inadequate government funding, lack of appropriate technology, neglect of institutional development, lack of beneficiary participation and poor coordination from top to the bottom. However, in 2003 the government introduced Constituency Development Fund (CDF), to fight poverty at the grassroots and since its inception; NG-CDF has had tremendous impact among the rural communities in Kenya

## j) Comments By The Area Member Of County Assembly

The area MCA appreciated the joint effort towards development in the constituency and called upon the members to diligently work for the betterment of the area. She pointed out that the elected leaders should be given an opportunity to serve the citizens and that politics should now be kept at bay until 2027. She thanked the NG-CDF team for organizing the forum since this is a vital road map towards people's driven development.

# k) Comments By The Fund Account Manager

He enlightened the members on the eligible projects fundable by NG-CDF and ineligible projects which are fundable by devolved systems, and also briefed the meeting on the statutory ceilings specified in the NG-CDF Act 2015 which guide the NG-CDFC during projects funding. He also stressed that after the exercise in all the wards the NGCDFC will rank the projects in order of priority and that the on-going projects shall take precedence over all other projects.

# 1) Comments By The NG-CDFC Chairman

The chairman appreciated the members concern for development. He highlighted that NGCDF has achieved a lot towards development in the constituency, and the overall aim of this is to ensure active participation of people in the achievement of sustainable development.

# m) Comments By The Area Member Of National Assembly

He mentioned that if the public is involved in the full decision-making process during projects identification, their concerns may be met early on in the planning process when changes may be easier to make, rather than late in the process when even small changes may cost both time and money.

He informed the meeting that NG-CDF was established with the aim of improving service delivery, alleviating poverty, enhancing economic governance, and ultimately to spur development in the constituencies thereby contributing to socio-economic development of all the constituencies.
